Top Tip - Seasoning.

I have enjoyed various tips of the day on the www.pipesdrums.com web site, which is one of the most viewed piping sites. It is worth checking out if you haven't done so already. I have taken most of the tips from our newsletter and forwarded the crucial parts to www.pipesdrums.com

The tip that I have felt most important was -don't over-season your bag - a little at a time is good. Don't expect a new bag to be totally tight straight away. You need to work on it for over a month or so to achieve an optimum bag performance. You can of course use it straight away but bear in mind that it will take some time to bed in properly. So the best advice is use a little seasoning at a time, say 1/4 tin, and play your pipes regularly.

You would expect to use 2 tins over a 2-3 month period, depending on the skin in question.

To finish off this session on Top Tips, remember to get your reeds etc sorted out for the new year - now is the time to act to give yourself time to achieve a perfect set-up.

P/M Robert Russell, of the Central Scotland Police Pipe Band, popped into the shop recently and when I asked him if he could contribute to the Top Tunes Selection, he gave an immediate and spontaneous response. Well done for that!

1. The Hebridean Polka - a polka by Alex M MacIver.
2. An ancient and unusual piobaireachd of which little is known -MacGregors' Salute.

In the 16th and 17th centuries, the MacGregor Piping School flourished near Glenlyon. One of the Clan's many eminent pipers was John MacGregor of Fortingall who became personal piper and attendant to Prince Charles Edward Stuart. He survived Culloden and in 1781, at the age of 73, won third prize at the Falkirk Tryst which claims to be the forerunner of modern piping competitions. He also is reputed to have had 9 sons, all of whom became pipers and thus established a piping dynasty.

Rab Russell, as he is generally known, adopts a consultative approach within the Band and works closely with his lead drummer, Peter Anderson, on music selection and execution, to try and ensure they achieve a harmonious result. Not all bands follow this model and as we know, it is far from "sweetness and light" in some bands. Rab's family is very much involved in the pipe band scene, with his twin sons playing the pipes under his direction and his daughter playing as a drummer with Lothian and Borders Police. Rab is currently considering another MacGregor for part of his next MSR selection for the Band - a very fine march called The Young MacGregor.

Rab, thanks for your selection. Watch out in future issues for other leading

figures in the world of piping and pipe bands making their Top Tunes selections.

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Special Report

Since we started this newsletter, you will have seen many famous pipers featured and I consider many of them as friends as well as loyal customers. My longest standing friend and one of the world's greatest pipers, is Roddy MacLeod, MBE who has achieved everything that is to be achieved in solo and band piping. We first met in 1972 and from the start of my business in 1980, Roddy has been a great supporter.
