Technical Feature

Further tips on pipe bags:

1. Never place in water at any time. The skins are specially tanned to take them from a moist state to a dry condition. Any moisture that is added to the skin will cause decay and return it to its original uncured state.

2. The inside of the bag is the more important side and one which customers obviously don't see. It is on this side however where you need the quality -hence the importance of dealing with a reputable and experienced bag manufacturer who will select and use only the highest quality skins.

3. Don't worry if the outside of the bag has some flay or vein marks. This is normal with a natural skin - it is the inside of the bag that counts.

4. Don't over season the bag -a little on a regular basis is preferred when achieving maximum performance and longevity.

5. Don't always expect a bag to be tight straight away. It needs worked upon and molded into shape and takes a little time to reach its peak state.

6. Some people stopper and inflate their bag for 30 minutes or even up to 24 hours to test for leakage. This is not necessary - a 20 second external inspection on an inflated bag will soon tell you if the bag is fully functional or not.

Special Feature

The Barludh - an explanation.

In 1760, Joseph MacDonald produced the first written book on pipe music in the style of piobaireachd of that era, and this included the Barludh - this was at the time the dynasty of the MacCrimmons was coming towards an end, after a glorious run of some two centuries. In September 1991 and after 30 years of research, Roderick Cannon published the first full explanation of the playing style. The Barludh is in fact a cutting movement from low g to high g, with 18 grace notes in between the theme notes making 20 in total. It is exceptionally difficult to execute and perhaps explains why this movement has not been in use in recent history. It is in effect a doubling of the crunluath or the creanludh as written by Joseph MacDonald and ably demonstrated today by Alan MacDonald. Alan, originally from Glenuig and currently based in Edinburgh, comes from a great piping family and in addition to his solo piping prowess, also teaches piping at the Piping Centre degree course. His brothers Dr Angus and lain are both great players and his cousin was the late, great P/M Angus MacDonald - Begg Bagpipes are proud to have a close association with such a talented family.

It remains a mystery as to why the Barludh all but disappeared - was it edited out because of its difficulty or was piping just taking an easier route?
