In the piping world, there would appear to be so many wild myths and untruths that it is almost farcical. A classic seems to be that by adding a sole to a pipe chanter, you can somehow affect the sound - I would suggest that whilst it helps the appearance, an imitation ivory sole or ivory sole or silver only helps to provide a professional appearance and will not make you sound any worse or better. The silver sole may if anything help give a nice solid weight and platform to the bottom of the chanter and give some degree of balance, in that the chanter remains like a pendulum clock i.e. totally fixed downwards and does not move until the last gracenote is implemented. Whilst such examples are part of the fun and mystic, it has caused the problem of knowing what is correct and what is not i.e. "my teacher told me this so it must be right." This therefore leads us to say you learn not just the good things from your mentor which is great but also the myths and perhaps shortcomings of the mentor. Hopefully, we all can say "I'm not sure, check this out etc" but I get the feeling that in piping, it's usually "I'm right and everyone else is wrong." Because we do not always interact with each other as much as we perhaps should, we find ourselves in a slightly lonely world and this is even more so with regard to solo or individual piping, when hours are spent practising on your own. This seems to have stemmed from the lack of the written work on the bagpipe as it has fundamentally been passed on from tutor to pupil verbally.

So it is important to try and find not just a knowledgeable teacher, but one that can direct you down the correct path and be able to get on with you on a personal level as well -and I don't mean just in the beer tent (which of course is also of value, if they are buying!)

## **Special Feature**

Most people mainly associate Begg Bagpipes with producing outstanding bags, but we also manufacture our own pipes and refurbish/upgrade pipes and chanters. The same attention to detail and hand-craftsmanship that we are well known for on the bags are also put into the pipes and chanters -a nice example of a hand crafted practice chanter in silver is shown here.

The African Blackwood practice chanter starts from ordering the hand engraved hall marked silver to the customer's design requirements -in this case celtic knot. Other options like thistle zoomorphic are also available. The wood at this time has already been seasoned fully and bored,



and is set aside ready for the silver when it has been made and assayed i.e. hall-marked. At this crucial stage, we then have the challenge to marry the two carefully together as both the silver and the



wood are delicate. A good fit is essential and this is where we have the advantage of a hand finish -millimeters are taken at a time. Eventually the chanter is tested for pitch and the all important mark of quality is stamped on the chanter neck, J BEGG-GLASGOW, again with great care and by hand.
