The top players are invited to the invitational events which are now in the majority and it's not a healthy situation.

Field Report - British Championships, May 2019

After four fantastic sunny days in Glasgow, you've guessed it! Saturday was overcast and chill y with the temperature going up and down every 5 minutes and making it very difficult to maintain the instruments. Photo below is of Annan and storm clouds! However, I listened to most of the bands tuning up and must say the sound in general was very good from all. The Grade 1 bands really are fairly close tone-wise, with the Power impressing me in particular. The Band had an impressive presence being large, smart and definitely in the mix this year. They are a great credit to Chris Armstrong. Shotts had a good sound under new P/M Emmet Conway and Lomond and Clyde

under new P/M Don Bradford also had a solid band. Both of these bands will improve and all in all, it was good start from them.

I preferred to wander about rather than to listen to everyone in the contest although I did tend to focus on the MSR. This format is chosen as a discipline and test but it can be very uninteresting when the same tunes are played from band to band. John Morrison of Assynt House was listed to be played by 8 bands out of 12. Blair Drummond, Susan Macleod and Islay Ball also appeared

multiple times. The winning band was St Laurence O' Toole from Dublin with last year's champions Scottish Power as runners-up.

At the Grade 2 event a rather strange position occurred in that the 2 piping judges had vastly different opinions - one judge had a band 1st whilst the other had them 15th. This was not just a single anomaly but continued throughout the result. No doubt a stewards' enquiry will be required. Coskelt from Northern Ireland won with Buchan Peterson from Aberdeenshire as runners up. I was impressed with The Royal Burgh of Annan who were 5th and are surely one to watch.

There was a somewhat poor attendance from the



public which was a little disappointing. The event however was run amazingly well and credit to Renfrew Events - free entry, free buses - brilliant. If Paisley can do this then why not the Worlds? Perhaps it is too much of a cash cow for Glasgow. Why not move along to Paisley when the current deal ends although I have a horrible feeling it's tied up in Glasgow for a few more years. All in all, it was a great day's playing from the hundred and odd bands - onto the UK champs in Lurgan, N Ireland in a month's time.
